

Back to School Speech Tips & Sample Script

How To Give an Effective Back-to-School Speech

Back-to-school events provide a great opportunity to communicate with staff, families and the community about your PTA/PTSA and the importance of involvement.

Use our tips and sample script to deliver a speech that will make a lasting impression.

- Think about your message. Talk about what your PTA/PTSA does to support the school. Avoid giving the impression that you're all about fundraising.
- Reassure families. Some families may be worried that if they volunteer, you'll ask for too much of their time.
- Encourage families and community members to volunteer, but don't beg.
- Keep it short. Time your talk and keep it to five minutes or less.
- Practice your speech. Run through it a few times in advance, even if it's by delivering the speech to your kids or your cat.
- Start off with an easy question that staff/families can answer with a show of hands, such as "How many of you are new to the school?" This will give you a chance to breathe before you launch into your speech.
- Don't worry about messing up. Staff/families are there to get information, not judge you on your public speaking skills.
- Help ease your nerves by carrying a note card with your key points on it in case you need to jog your memory.

What Should I Say?

Welcome to the ABC Elementary Event! I'm Mary Brown, and I'm president of the ABC Elementary PTO.

Along with the rest of our PTA/PTSA board, I'd like to thank you for being here tonight. Staff, families and community members are so important to a school's success, and the PTA/PTSA is a key way that we can all support our school.

Now, by "support," I'm not just talking about fundraising. Yes, we raise money for (list items PTA/PTSA has funded), and much more, and you'll be hearing more from us about that as the school year gets under way. Here are just a few of the highlights from last school year, made possible in part by PTA/PTSA volunteers and funding: (Sample examples: • the annual 3rd grade field trip to the Museum of Science • snacks provided for more than 270 students during testing week • two book fairs, during which hundreds of books went home with students and onto the shelves of our school library • a family reading night with the mayor and police chief serving as celebrity readers • new audio equipment installed for use in school assemblies and student performances • new classroom rugs for all preK through 1st grade teachers • a reception for graduating 5th graders and their families)

If you're looking for a way to get involved at school, we can help. We have moms, dads, grandparents, and other family and community members who help out. Our volunteers are in the classroom but also at home. Any amount of time you can give is great, whether it's two hours a year or two hours a week. Whatever works best for you, we can make it work!
